- We are best known for our life-changing guide dog partnerships but we are also the largest employer of specialists dedicated to helping children and young people with a vision impairment learn, grow and access the same opportunities as everyone else.

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There are 28,000 children (under 18) who are blind or partially sighted in the UK and at Guide Dogs we know having the right support in place early on can be life changing. So much of what we learn in our early years is through vision: how to move around safely, how to organise our belongings, how to dress, how to interact socially. But children with low or no vision need to learn about the world in a slightly different way.

Habilitation plays a crucial role in empowering children with sight loss to develop their independence. It brings together expertise across mobility, sensory development and early years education to teach the skills a child with a vision impairment may need to learn in a different way because they cannot learn by watching others.

Our Habilitation Specialists play a transformative role, supporting children and young people of all ages to build the confidence to explore the world - from supporting physical development in the early years to navigating streets safely, preparing food, handling money, using technology and managing their appearance as they grow older.

Where does spirituality fit into sight loss?- Finding hope in faith and community.

Torch Trust explores the relationship between spirituality and health in the midst of sight loss.



Torch Trust focuses on the spiritual support and encouragement of blind and partially sighted people.

As insights into health and wellbeing have increased, we are starting to look more holistically at the relationship between the different components of health; from physical, to emotional, mental, social and spiritual health. As we work with others and look at our own wellbeing, it can be easy to see how changes in one part of our being can have a wider impact - e.g. how significant emotional events can impact physical health.

At Torch Trust, we believe that spirituality can play an important role in wellbeing and that sight loss should never be something that holds someone back from having a full, rich spiritual life. We are a distinctively Christian charity and our spirituality is rooted in our faith in Jesus, but the principles of celebrating and supporting spirituality hold true across all kinds of spiritual expression. So what benefits can spirituality bring and how can we support those with sight loss in realising these?

For those going through an experience of sight loss – whether for the first time or through the changing of an existing condition, there is often a period of bereavement and grief. For many, faith is about having hope in the midst of uncertainty - believing that, even when the road ahead seems hard and when having faith feels like a tough battle, there is someone who is holding them steady and guiding them on.

Often, faith-based groups will have gatherings where people meet together to share their faith and to encourage and support one another. As Christians, we find that churches can often be like a second family – providing community support and a sense of belonging through all of the stages of life.

We are passionate about those with sight loss experiencing this – to have a place to ask the wider questions of life and journey with others rather than experiencing loneliness and isolation.

Engaging the senses and making creativity accessible for visually impaired individuals.

Elaine Ruth White, a writer and researcher with a clinical background in mental health, discusses wellbeing and creative expression.

Research shows that creative writing can significantly help our emotional and mental wellbeing.

The onset of Covid had a devastating impact on the freedom to fully use all our senses. Touch, for instance, became a potential threat, as did smell, which relies upon breathing in the world around us. And as more of our lives went online, our contact with others, and ourselves, became more sterile.

Creative writing is about engaging the senses. Our senses affect our perception of the world, which in turn affects our mood or anxiety levels. For instance, the sound of the wind (external noise), or the chatter of negative thoughts in our head (internal noise) can both impact our feeling, or actual experience, of safety and security. For those of us with a significant challenge to one or more of our senses, the loss of sensory information is exactly that - a loss.

But taking a sensory approach to creative writing does more than just create a pleasant stimulus. Our senses combine to create a synergy; a combined effect that is greater than the sum of its individual parts.

Available in large text, braille, and audio, each therapeutic pack contains cards with a range of guided creative writing exercises, which include the use of specially selected essential oils, visualisation exercises, or the use of touch, taste, or hearing.

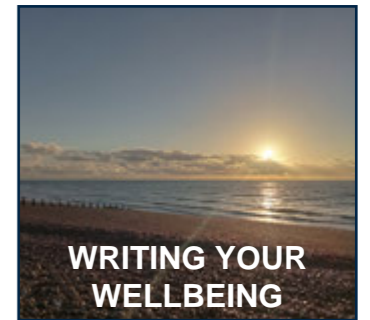

Some packs focus on a particular mental health issue, such as mood, trauma, or loss. Other packs focus on creativity, or relaxation, or exploring and improving your wellbeing, alone, or with friends or family.

The physical act of writing is not always necessary. We are, first and foremost, storytellers, and before writing as we know it was developed, there was a rich oral tradition. Voice recording can add another dimension to the sensory side of your creativity.

Can't work, can work!

Paul Hopkins of Queen Alexandra Enterprises' All Formats discusses the need for workplaces to be made more inclusive of blind and partially sighted (BPS) individuals, and some of the ways that employers can achieve this.

Queen Alexandra Charity can trace its roots back 180 years to the founding in 1846 of a school for blind and partially sighted people. A Birmingham merchant, William Harrold had a dream. His daughter Miss Elizabeth Bache Harrold, alongside her friend Miss Mary Elizabeth Badger and some other enlightened Victorian pioneers, made it a reality - and we've been building on that legacy ever since.

The number of BPS people of working age not in employment, standing conservatively at 75%, is, in all honesty, staggering. Why is this, and how can we work together to change a narrative which is so pervasive and persistent?

Time to Address Some Misconceptions?

Problem-Solving: Those of us who are BPS often navigate a world not built for us. This builds high-level skills in spatial awareness, tech-savviness (using assistive tools), and creative problem-solving.

The Talent Gap: Excluding or under-supporting our demographic means businesses are losing out on a resilient, highly adaptable workforce.

Breaking the Barriers?

Digital Accessibility Barriers: It's not just about screen readers; it's about inclusive design from the ground up. If a job portal isn't accessible, the talent never even makes it to the door.

The "Attitude" Barrier: Often, the biggest hurdle isn't our vision impairment itself, but the assumption by others of what we can't do.

Workplace Adjustments: Simple (and often low-cost) adjustments like magnification software, high-contrast keyboards, or flexible lighting can level the playing field.

The EDI Intersection

Intersectionality: We, as blind and partially sighted people, are more than just our vision impairment. We may also face barriers related to race, gender, or socioeconomic status, which can compound employability challenges.

Retention versus Recruitment: EDI isn't just about hiring; it's about keeping people. How does a company support an employee whose vision might change over time?

Creating an inclusive pathway for candidates with sight loss doesn't require a total overhaul of your business - it requires intentionality. Here are some tips to help you move your business from "accessible" to "inclusive".

1. Audit the gatekeeper

If your application portal or PDF job descriptions aren't screen-reader friendly, you've excluded top talent before they've even applied.

2. Offer choice in format

Ask every candidate, "What format would you like these interview materials in?" This helps to remove the "burden of disclosure" from the candidate.

3. Focus on outcomes, not methods

Instead of asking "How would you read this report?", ask "How would you analyse and present this data?" There are many ways to get to the finish line.

4. Normalise assistive tech

Treat a screen reader or a braille display like a second monitor or a high-spec laptop. It's just a tool that enables high performance.

5. Interview the environment

Ensure your interviewers are trained. For example, when greeting a candidate with a vision impairment, introduce everyone in the room by name and position so the candidate can develop a "mental map" of who is where.

At Queen Alexandra Charity, there has always been a strong emphasis on creating pathways to employment with many initiatives around specialist education and the development of social enterprises which currently include: All Formats transcription services; Revolution Advantage Graphite Canes; Facilities for Hire and Sight Village.

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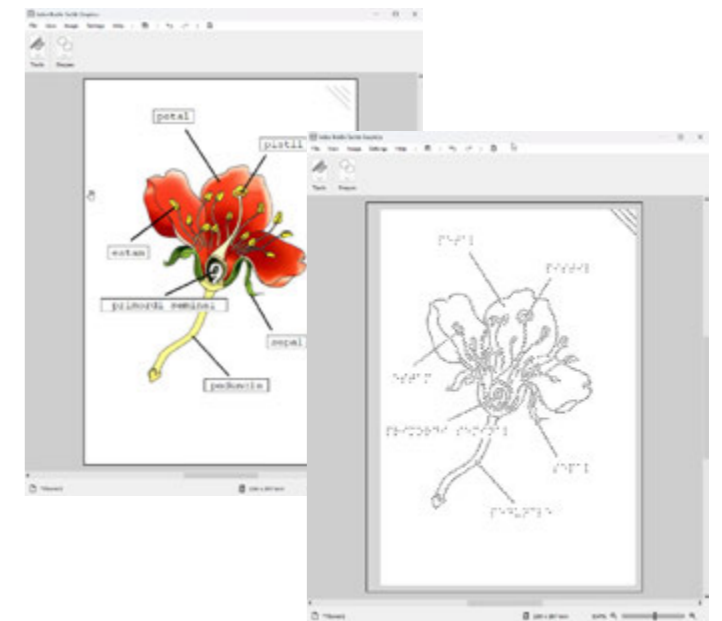
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We're the **Keratoconus Group (UK)** - a national charity supporting people affected by keratoconus.

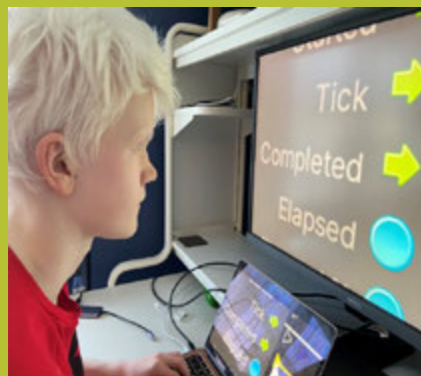

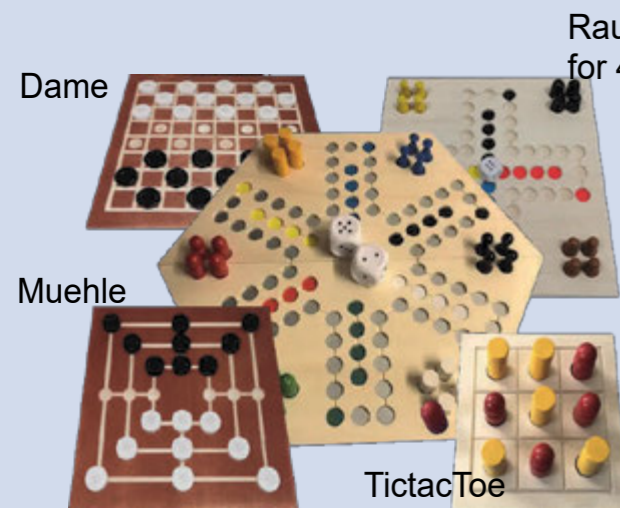

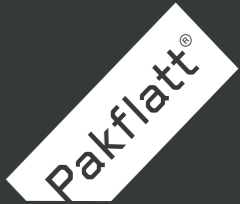
This is just a small selection of the various games we offer. We produce many of them ourselves or adapt them for tactile enjoyment. This allows blind people and their families to enjoy playing games together.

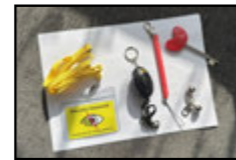

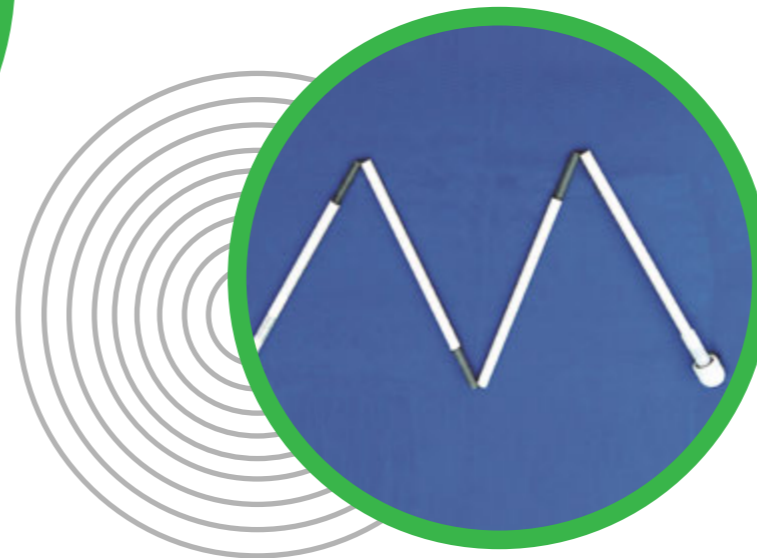
