October saw the opening of QAC's new enterprise; situated on Bearwood High Street, next to our very own iCycle, Coffee Junction brings a fresh, family friendly café experience to the local community.

The café was officially opened by local chef Steve Love, whose restaurant 'Loves' was recently voted into the UK's top 100 restaurants. Steve took time out of his busy schedule to come along and speak with staff and customers before cutting the ribbon and declaring the café open. Manager, Ismail Orel, was thrilled to welcome Steve along to the launch saying "the team are extremely proud of Coffee Junction, so it is an honour that Steve could come and support us". Guests were treated to samples of what will be on offer, with a range of drinks and sweet treats including chocolate brownies and macaroons.

The project has been ongoing for a long time and is the result of a successful fundraising bid to the Demographic Growth Capital Fund (DGCF). As well as being a popular coffee shop the site offers training opportunities for young people with disabilities. This is possible because the second floor of the unit is a fully equipped state of the art training kitchen.

Jodie Burkin, Hospitality Tutor at QAC says "to have such a professional kitchen for our students to work in is fantastic, it really gives them a feel for working in the Hospitality industry". On looking around, Steve was impressed with the facilities and it is hoped that QAC students and staff will be able to work with him in the future.

Since the official opening the café has also seen the introduction of 'Coffee Jungle', an interactive play and reading area for toddlers, complete with furry and feathered friends. Already popular with local residents, this adds another element to the Coffee Junction experience, making it fun and welcoming for customers of all ages.

Since opening, the café has become a social media star on Bearwood Blog and 'We Love Bearwood' and has proved to be a popular meeting venue in the local community with more people visiting each week. Disability Sports Forum (BDSF), working to increase sporting opportunities for people with disabilities across the city. October half term saw the partnership's first 'Sports Fest' week with a range of activities being held across Birmingham. QAC were proud to attend the launch event at Alexander Stadium where students had the opportunity to chat with Paralympian Claire Cashmore (winner of two silver medals and one bronze medal at the 2012 games) and have a go at wheelchair rugby with members of the GB team.

Following an application for funding QAC came top in the 'Education' category of The Yorkshire Bank Community
Foundation Awards earlier in the year.
The money has enabled the Performing Manufacturing Operations (PMO) team to purchase an embroidery machine and printing system. They have already been busy printing posters, mugs and t-shirts and the team hope that 'QAC Print' will build into a mini enterprise where they can design and produce merchandise for College and external customers.

As part of National Guide Dog Week in October Guide Dogs brought a sensory tunnel and guide dogs into College. Sighted students were able to walk through a pitch black tunnel and experience a taste of life without sight; smelling freshly mown grass, listening to traffic and countryside noises and feeling different surfaces under foot and at their fingertips.

October was Black History Month and students had the opportunity to learn about Martin Luther King and experience a taste of the Caribbean, listening to a steel band and tasting lots of different Caribbean foods.

Following a £10,000 grant from Awards for All, QAC is in the process of purchasing a radio system to enable students to create and produce their own radio shows to be aired across the internet.

PfL Green visit Asda (Oldbury) every Friday to help develop their independent living skills, with each student having the opportunity to select and pay for their shopping. They are supported by the same member of the checkout team every week who, as a result, has been awarded Employee of the Month in store!

Residential students have been busy organising a range of activities in their houses including focus groups, games nights, a Halloween party, shopping trips and bowling competitions.

'Conversation Corner', set up by our Speech and Language Therapy (SALT) team is a club helping students develop communication and conversation skills and become socially equipped for the outside world. To put theory into practice this term students have enjoyed various activities including trips to cafés, the city centre and the Frankfurt Christmas Market.

Children in Need came to QAC in November with students and staff taking part in a range of activities including cake sales, penny trails, sponsored canoe trips and henna/glitter tattoos, raising almost £500 in the process!

Brendan Lynch, a passionate baker and Great British Bake Off finalist in 2012, met up with BTEC Hospitality students

at our QA Café to deliver two cooking demonstrations, creating double crusted apple tart and Irish soda bread... Yum!!







advance 2 work

advance2work (A2W) is QAC's employment support programme funded by the Department for Work and Pensions and aims to support people aged 18 or above with disabilities who want to move into employment.

Our experienced team of Tutors and Employment Consultants work with clients to develop individualised programmes which can last from a few weeks up to a year if necessary.

Until recently A2W were based at our main College site but with student numbers increasing, the team have moved to their own dedicated offsite base in Edgbaston. The move was quite a significant change but the team of 12 staff, along with current clients, have now settled in.

There are still close links with the College campus with departments visiting the A2W site to offer workshops and one-to-one support where needed. Sherv Garcha, Head of DWP Programmes, says "both staff and clients have found the move to be a positive thing. Although we can still access the support offered at College, they have their own self contained premises and they like that".

Being based in a commercial working environment has enabled the programme to develop its own identity and create a more realistic training experience for clients. The move has also created new opportunities for work placements and reinforced A2W's reputation as a training provider in its own right.

Working with around 60 clients over the course of the year the team believe the move will be fantastic in enabling them to work with clients to further develop the skills, confidence and employability of each individual.

Sports Hall ★ Update ★

After just over a year of fundraising we are nearing the end of our 'Fit for the Future' Sports Hall campaign. Students, staff, families and supporters of QAC have been getting behind the campaign organising their own events, buying bricks and getting involved in various sponsored challenges from skydives and cycle challenges to the Birmingham Half Marathon.

Thanks to support from a number of trusts and foundations, local organisations and individuals we have now raised over £1,140,000 towards the £1.37m target and are excited to be moving into the planning stages for the building works. We are in the process of awarding the building contract. Internal details from flooring to wall colours have been chosen and soon our dreams of a sports hall will be realised with onsite works due to commence in December 2013. We look forward to the summer newsletter when we will be just weeks away from completion and finally having keys to our very own sports hall!

Campus Developments

In addition to the sports hall project we are also busy working on other campus developments to enhance provision for our students.

We have been fortunate enough to secure funding to refurbish some of our older onsite buildings, creating new teaching spaces and improving the internal look and feel of the buildings. The funding will allow us to carry out works on the Maintenance building, Oakwood Teaching Centre and the Evolution building with QAC contributing 50% match funding to the project.

What is currently our Maintenance building will soon be transformed into a new, fully accessible teaching centre with 4 modern classrooms, allowing us to increase our provision. Oakwood and Evolution will receive some much needed attention, being brought up to specification, with improved lighting, soundproofing, changing facilities and storage to name but a few of the works that will be taking place across these two areas.

QAC has also been lucky enough to secure the lease to a garden centre in Selly Oak. We are in the process of exploring the many opportunities available for retail and training to support and enhance QAC's work. Several local organisations have expressed support for the project and we look forward to developing a working relationship with many of these as our Umberslade Nurseries project develops.

QAC is currently working with Amey to construct a fantastic new 'travel training area' on our campus. The area will simulate a street and will feature various crossings, kerb heights, surfaces, slopes and obstacles. It will create a safe and controllable environment where the Mobility team will be able to teach vital independence skills for many of our students, especially wheelchair and long cane users.

All Aboard!



Our Independence Plus (IP) service is a 52 week supported living provision. In August, an IP crew of 7 clients and 3 staff took part in the Hammond Innes Centenary Race, sailing from Ipswich to the Isle of Wight.

All ships taking part left Ipswich harbour to cheers and waves from the crowds who came to see the sailors off on their exciting journey. The race started with breathtaking views along the east coast near Clacton on Sea and continued south towards the Kent coast as the crew learnt how to sail the boat correctly.

Unfortunately as the race proceeded the wind dropped leaving our boat, Pegasus and the other ships stuck off the coast near Eastbourne. Listening to the forecast there was no hint of a breeze to come and the crew decided to continue the voyage using engine power.

On the last day, after ships were inspected by actress Celia Imrie, everyone who took part attended a BBQ and presentation evening. Despite some seasickness and rough seas everyone who went had a fantastic time and thoroughly enjoyed life at sea onboard Pegasus.
