Duke of Edinburgh

Our Duke of Edinburgh Award programme continues to be successful, with 7 students currently taking part, with 2 of them already passing their Bronze Award, now working towards their Silver.

In order to achieve their Awards, students have to complete a range of activities evidencing their work over a 3-6 month period. Although students are encouraged to choose new activities as part of their Award, the team also support them in College based activities that can be used as evidence, including volunteering at College sports activities and Enterprises, and learning new communication methods as part of their Award.

Students also have to take part in an expedition, requiring route planning and campcraft skills as they have an overnight stay on a campsite, which for some is a massive challenge to complete.



In May, our commitment to the programme was rewarded as staff members Debbie and Gaynor represented QAC at the Diamond Anniversary of the DofE Award at Buckingham Palace. During the event, also attended by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, HRH The Earl of Wessex and HRH The Countess of Wessex, they were presented with a special plaque by celebrity supporter, Michelin chef Marcus Wareing, acknowledging QAC's commitment to running the programme. Debbie and Gaynor were chosen out of thousands of people involved in delivering the DofE programme across the UK so it really was an honour and once in a lifetime

Umberslade on the Up!

Lots of exciting things have been happening at Umberslade. Thanks to a donation from Morrisons Foundation we now have a traditional yurt and sensory garden area and thanks to teams at Amey we have a new path and seating area, opening up more of the site to be used.

Funding from Zurich Community Trust and Edgar E Lawley Foundation enabled us to run 'cake and craft' workshops for people with dementia and the over 50s, both proving really popular with local community groups and individuals. We

have secured funding from The Brian Shaw Memorial Trust for a nature watch project, so critter homes and habitats will be introduced soon. Over the summer we will be working with Gro-Organic to develop outdoor cooking and seating areas, complete with an 'earth oven'!

Many students still attend Umberslade and play a vital role in the work there but as you can see, there is lots more going on too!

JANUARY



The Dragons' Den panel was back in force as 18 groups pitched their ideas for 'investment'. As with previous rounds, a wide range of activities were put forward and the 'dragons' were pleased to fund all of them in some way. As a result, some students went to local attractions such as Cadbury World and West Midlands Safari Park, purchase equipment for their IT and Creative Media studies and go to eat at local restaurants.

Students (and staff) took part in a 'Show & Tell Day' where they were able to share their interests and showcase personal collectables/models that are important to them. We had a student playing the guitar, a display of puppets and an extremely popular display of Lego models by student volunteer Jason. It was a really fun and informative day for all involved.

FEBRUARY

As part of storytelling day, our very own storyteller 'Steven Sunshine' came to College to tell stories using 'bag books'. Bag Books are ideal for those who enjoy stories that are told interactively through voice, emotion and props. There was plenty of excitement, laughter and interaction from the audience as 'Steven' took them all on a trip to the seaside!.

We hosted a "A Right not a Fight" event, with students from many different specialist colleges delivering brilliant presentations about their experiences of battling to receive funding for their chosen college place.

QAC students, staff and parents worked with the local charity 'Socks and Chocs' to collect items and donate them to local homeless people. The collection was presented to the charity's Chairman Ian Northcott (also known as the Busking Bobby), who also gave a rendition of his Busking Bobby song. This was a valuable learning experience for our students as they took part in a range of activities to explore the idea of homelessness and poverty and the impact they have.

MARCH

The Strings Club, a local Harborne organisation that provides instrumental tuition, visited QAC bringing a large selection of ukuleles and violins with them. Students had the opportunity to try the different instruments creating short music pieces whilst also listening to jazz, popular and classical music being played in new and different ways.

It was a very cold day but this didn't deter the group as they scrubbed all the tables and chairs, crockery, cutlery, ceiling, walls, windows, wash basin, floor and front deck of the boat which was gleaming by the end of the day! They did such a good job they were invited back for a free boat trip in July where they enjoyed fish and chips delivered to the boat for lunch as they sailed down the canal.

Sport students travelled to Loughborough University, in order to take part in the Inclusive Futures Camp, delivered by Youth Sport Trust. They were joined by other volunteers and took part in a range of sessions and workshops, Sport Relief Judo

delivered by a number of athlete mentors. The aim of the event was to equip young volunteers with the skills to promote participation in sport, challenging perceptions around disability and creating inclusive provisions in their home cities.

APRIL

Health & Social Care students Beth and Cher presented to a large audience at this year's Natspec Conference, being great ambassadors for QAC as they spoke of their experience of disability and the support a specialist environment offers them.

PFL Orange enjoyed some wizardry and wonder as they visited Harry Potter Studios for their Dragons' Den trip. The group received VIP treatment as they arrived, with student Adam Smith celebrating his birthday early by opening the Great Hall doors for visitors! Everyone tried their hand at wand waving and broomstick flying, had a "ride" on the train and also enjoyed a butter beer ice-cream or a butter beer in the sunshine!

Students from PFL and Vocational groups, along with clients from IP, took to the stage to take part in the auditions for this year's QA Factor. The hall was filled with lots of singing and dancing, by performers and those in the audience, as the judges had the difficult task of choosing who they were going to put through to the final which will be part of our Summer Games in July.

Two student football teams took part in the PAN Disability Football Tournament at The Hawthorns, home of West Bromwich Albion. Both teams did really well, ending the tournament with 1 win, 1 draw and 1 loss and everyone had a great time and are looking forward to being involved in more tournaments of this kind in the future!

Sport students were volunteering again, this time at the Youth Sport Trust / Special Olympics 'Play Unified' summit. Rather than running sports sessions, they (along with other

Employment Pathways

Our Employability Pathways programme has been extremely successful this year achieving 76 external and 136 internal placements and we would like to share a few of these successes:

- > Two supported interns successfully completed placements at the *Queen Elizabeth Hospital* where they helped with various administrative duties and designing training booklets.
- > Two students have worked in the Mechanics Department at *The Belfry Golf Course* helping repair, maintain and valet vehicles and machinery, also enjoying a tour of the course in a buggy and lunch at The Belfry Hotel.
- > Three students successfully completed full time placements at *Barclays Bank* working in a variety of departments, including Customer Service
- > Two students have worked at Thrift Vintage Quinton, one doing visual merchandising and serving customers, the other helping set up an online selling platform and completing E-Commerce activities.

Work placements are really valuable in providing students with opportunities to develop a range of skills and confidence in a real working environment and we are really proud of all our students. Now complete, the project proved extremely popular with students, so much so that one student now attends Activ8 on a Saturday because he enjoyed it so much! Deb also enjoyed working on the project and has since secured other funding to enable trampolining sessions to continue at QAC.

Also thanks to Sportivate support, our basketball club involved students and clients working with qualified coaches to learn about Wheelchair and Inclusive Zone Basketball, with two members of staff training to be British Wheelchair Basketball Leaders.

More recently, Sportivate funding enabled us to deliver onsite archery sessions to students and clients, with a taster session in March being extremely popular, followed by an 8 week block of sessions where skills and enthusiasm were developed further.

In April, PFL Green visited Woodgate Valley Fire Station as part of their 'Community Participation' unit. They had a great time meeting Blue Watch and seeing where they worked, also getting to sit on the engine, hold some of the equipment the crew use and work the hose as it pumped gallons of water out. They also got to experience the smoke room training facility where they had to find their way through the dark to 'rescue' someone.

In May, Blue Watch brought the fire engine to College, allowing more students to climb into the cabin and explore the interior of the truck and ask lots of questions about the truck and what it's like to be a fireman; some even got to try on the jacket and helmet for size.

We are now working with the team to organise fire safety visits where they will come out to College to work with our residential students and IP clients in their houses. Sessions will look at what is and is not safe when working in the kitchen, giving them tips on how to stay safe at all times.

A big thank you to Blue Watch, and the other crews at Woodgate Valley for all the help, support and activities you run with us, we really enjoy them!



Fundraising

The Birmingham 10k took place in May and 'Team QAC' was there to pound the streets. We had 18 runners take part, with 14 of them pushing themselves to the limit to win 'Runner Up' in the 'Mixed Team: Medium Business' and 'Women's Team: Medium Business' categories. Four more runners completed their own personal challenge, with two of them running the course blindfolded. James Bee and Derek McDonagh from the Macdonald Burlington Hotel are keen runners, and chose to take on the challenge after getting to know our governor 'Blind Dave' Heeley. Supported by Karl and Garry, two of Dave's regular guide runners, they took on the course and raised over £1,200 for us, also getting staff at the hotel

Our Summer Fete took place in June, filling the courtyard with a range of stall including crafters, Cats Protection League, Guide Dogs, books, Umberslade Nurseries and Coffee Junction BBQ, with Qi Energy and Hariba Belly Dancing Group joining the fun! New to the event this year were circus skills workshops, an archery competition and a fun dog show — all of which proved really popular with visitors.
